

Our commitment to deepen the nuance and complexity of Jewish narratives led us to launch the JFI COMPLETION GRANTS PROGRAM, the first and only U.S.-based finish-line funding stream for Jewish-content films of all genres. This move was an important addition to the independent film community and vital to the Jewish arts and culture landscape. The program supports original stories that promote thoughtful consideration of Jewish history, life, culture and identity. Priorities are given to projects that offer fresh, challenging

perspectives; reflect untold stories or under-represented communities; and engage audiences across cultural lines. In 2020, JFI awarded six inaugural completion grants totaling \$75,000 and will scale up to \$100,000 in 2021. Five of the six films have already been completed and three had their debuts in leading festivals, including Doc Aviv, Doc NYC and JFI. JFI's **FILMMAKER RESIDENCY**, first launched in 2014, provides creative, marketing and production support for filmmakers in residence who are in various stages of their projects. The Residency provides Bay Area filmmakers with artist spaces and access to the screening room at our Ninth Street Independent Film Center. During the pandemic, we expanded our cohort to eight diverse filmmakers from the East Coast to the West, including some new to filmmaking, and continued the program on Zoom.

JFI expanded to reach and move more audiences across the world than ever before.

Our online programs brought Jewish-content films and panels to audiences in 65 countries across five continents, including those who have little direct access to Jewish film and culture. During 2018 and 2019, JFI programs welcomed more than 60 filmmakers and guests from around the world to a spirited audience of over 40,000 in theaters throughout the Bay Area. We commissioned original scores to newly restored silent films such as *THE CITY WITHOUT JEWS* and *BROKEN BARRIERS*, attracting new audiences—Jewish and non-Jewish alike. With more than 3 million views on the web and over 75K views on Facebook alone, JFI drew more than 1 million new viewers between 2018-2020, due, in part to the rapid expansion of our online programs during the pandemic. In 2020, JFI hosted not one but two full festivals, offering a hybrid of drive-in and on-line experiences. An audience of 36,000 tuned in for four CINEGOGUE SUMMER DAYS that were free for all. Our rebooted 40TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION during Hanukkah offered up eight days of films and brought us together in community. JFI will carry forward the silver linings from 2020, continuing hybrid programming as we transition back into theaters again soon.

JFI's collaborations with the film industry and major cultural institutions enable us to bring the best work back home to the Bay Area and our audiences across the world. In partnership with the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, SFJFF was named the first Jewish film festival anywhere to become an Academy Award® qualifier in the Best Documentary (Short Subject) category. In 2018, we became an official partner of the Sundance Film Festival, presenting an annual panel discussion tied to a World Premiere screening. In a new partnership with the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, we presented HOLY SILENCE, examining the role of the Vatican during the Holocaust. JFI's programming team has grown our presence at leading festivals across the world, including Berlinale, SXSW, Toronto and Tribeca. In our Bay Area home, JFI co-owns the Ninth Street Independent Film Center, a creative hub for filmmakers and film organizations, along with the Center for Asian American Media and Frameline. Our Ninth Street partnership enables cross-cultural collaborations centered on shared experiences. Among JFI's newest community partners is the Museum of the African Diaspora. We teamed up in 2018 to present SAMMY DAVIS, JR.: I'VE GOTTA BE ME as SFJFF38's Closing Night selection. Each new connection has been vital to expanding JFI's audience and brought new depth, complexity and nuance to our work.

cultivating community





JFI's heart is in community—exploring and celebrating the full spectrum of Jewish culture and identity is central to all of our work. Through 40-years of expert curation, exhibition of and support for innovative films and filmmakers, we cultivate community and catalyze conversations that uplift the multicultural, multiracial nature of our global Jewish communities. JFI hosted more than 250 unique events 2018-2020, using each to explode the myth of a monolithic Jewish story and provide lively ways for audiences to connect. Our annual JFI TAKE ACTION DAY at the SFJFF, embodies the Jewish tradition of Tikkun Olam ("repairing the world") showcasing films that address timely and important social justice issues. Our MITZVAH **PROGRAM** is an important cornerstone of JFI's community engagement: through it, we bring new and archival films to individuals incarcerated at San Quentin State Prison and less-mobile senior communities across the Bay Area. Each year we work with over 150 community partners who collaborate on programs and events to bring their constituencies into the conversation and JFI community. In 2020, adapting for Covid, our online interviews and discussions have included closed captioning and sign language interpretation in order to make these programs more accessible to all.


nurturing new voices




Future generations have a special place in JFI's heart and mission. With dedicated programs for teens and young adults, JFI engages communities of Gen Z and Millennial film lovers and aspiring filmmakers. At NEXT WAVE events, JFI provides dynamic live programming with food, music, comedy and film pairings year-round. Launched in 2015, our offerings were increasingly in demand 2018-2020, including through the pandemic, and are now reaching global audiences. Just one screening in 2020—co-presented with Frameline during Pride Month—had over 1,000 views on social media and 600+ attendees for a live Zoom event alone. Now in its third year, the FESTIVAL YOUTH JURY participants learn about film curation and criticism and present the Youth Jury Award. In 2020, in response to our call for entries, the Jury vetted almost 300 shorts from 35 countries. The winning film—MASEL TOV COCKTAIL—was co-directed by two film students from Berlin, Germany. In 2021, JFI will offer the first-ever JFI SOCIAL CHANGE FILM FELLOWSHIP for teens, engaging a talented cohort of 12 Bay Area high school fellows in the 15-month pilot program. The Fellows will work as a team alongside JFI staff to craft and promote a series of social justice-focused screenings and conversations for audiences in the Bay Area and beyond.

Since our inception 40 years ago, JFI has kept track of every film brought to our audiences across the Bay Area and around the world. We house the JFI ARCHIVE, the largest digital database of Jewish content films anywhere, period. By 2020 our archive surpassed 1,800 films with 450 indexed to stream on our online platform JFI ON DEMAND. All online content—including JFI curated and produced content—jumped from 1.3M views in 2018 to over 3M in 2020. Scholars, students and film enthusiasts around the world use these resources to search film collections by topic. In 2018, interest in our archive and JFI on Demand grew. Clicks revealed a 400% increase in just two years from 10,000 to 40,000 annual views. Our **MONTHLY ONLINE SHORTS** program also hit important milestones. In 2019, the program surpassed its 100th monthly film mark and 10-year anniversary. Platforms for online screenings powered by Vimeo, YouTube, Facebook, Zoom and on our CINEGOGUE BLOG connected audiences and inspired innovation during the pandemic. An audience favorite was a groundbreaking conversation about the Disability Justice movement with

> the creators and subjects of the Academy Award®-nominated documentary, CRIP CAMP. These additions have been an essential part of this growth and are shaping what comes next.
















stories she tells

In this #MeToo era, with Time's Up in full swing, and organizations like Geena Davis Institute, Sundance, Women In Film, 50/50 by 2020 and Gamechanger Films agitating for gender parity, a new consciousness seems to be changing things in the entertainment industry. But even with this progress, there is a long way to go. In the almost 100-year history of the Academy Awards®, only five women have been nominated for Best Director. Women account for only 25% of tv creators, while 79% of tv shows employ no women directors at all. These statistics don't begin to reflect the persistent, unquantifiable obstacles women and people of color encounter working on both sides of the camera. To lean in on these issues more fully, in honor of JFI's 40th Anniversary we launched STORIES SHE TELLS, a new two-year initiative that shines a spotlight on the contributions of Jewish women in front of and behind the camera. Guest Curator, Caroline Libresco, the founding director of the Sundance Women's Initiative and Sundance Catalyst, and the former Associate Director of the SFJFF, returned to JFI to curate this groundbreaking program which runs through 2021.



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




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
